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

However, it's not simply the nail plate that's clear; it's the glasslike effect in the extension edge that's garnering all of the attention. While creating this look may seem like a hassle to achieve, think again, as this month's cover artist, Brittney Boyce, attests. She uses ORLY's new Builder in a Bottle on the regular for her clients in the salon and showed us how easy it is to use on the cover set. Boyce's best tip? "Long, slow strokes," she says, as this will keep bubbles from forming. To highlight the clarity in the tips, Boyce then added hints of GelFX Lucid Dream (one of the dazzling hues in ORLY's holiday 2018 collection, Deep Wonder) as well as swatches of gold glitter gel polish randomly across the nails. And what are crystalline nails without, well, crystals? Boyce added a few touches at the smile line and base of the nail to finish off the sparkling effect.









This Rococo-inspired set, featuring Vero Krew Diamonds, was created by Miss Pop. "When I was handed carats of diamonds to play with, I felt like a spoiled Marie Antoinette!" the nail artist exclaims. "This design was inspired by her palace Versaille—luxurious, spectacular and unforgettable." The conflict-free gems are available in round, oval, pear and trillion shapes in sizes ranging from .05 to .5 carats.

Users can also create boomerang videos and take nailfies to share on social media. While the app is targeted at helping consumers try on polish shades before they buy, nail salons can also use the app to



help clients decide on a shade of polish. "Creativity through nail art is part of the heritage of the Orly brand, and we loved the idea of bringing that outlet to consumers through an app that's both limitless and easy to use," says Orly vice president of business development Tal Pink. "Do we think digital nail polish will replace the real thing? Probably not, but this has the potential to inspire a lot of fun photo booth experiences for nails and also be a useful tool for consumers and others."

BUSINESS RECIPE FOR SUCCESS

Nail art menus can help boost profits and client satisfaction.

Thanks to social media, a near endless supply of nail art inspiration is accessible to anyone with a smartphone—a boon for clients, but a burden for many nail techs who may not be prepared to recreate the look a client asks for. After experiencing this situation firsthand as a client, Lauren Caruso decided to utilize a nail art menu when she opened her own salon, Color Camp, in Los Angeles last year. "I found it frustrating as a consumer, so I thought having a menu would help people know what to expect before they showed up," she says.

Besides making it easier for salons to meet clients' nail art expectations, menus can also help them differentiate their brand, says Cyndi Ramirez, founder and CEO of Chillhouse in New York and The Chill Times website. "We offer a nail art menu for a couple of reasons," she says. "One: We thought it was important to inject the Chillhouse brand into nail designs and provide people with a curated experience. And two: for the competitive advantage. Why would someone get a manicure at Chillhouse versus her corner nail salon? What would make people travel from different boroughs, even different states? The nail art menu is one of those reasons."

Nail art menus can take a number of forms, depending on the salon's objectives and brand identity. Sundays salon in New York, for example, utilizes an illustrated menu of six to eight simple looks–updated seasonally–that can be customized with clients' colors of choice. "Our nail art is catered to our clients' specific needs," says Sundays founder and CEO Amy Ling Lin. "It's very minimal, very modern." Color Camp, meanwhile, displays its nail art menu–nail tips mounted on a board–on the salon's wall. Clients can opt for one of the more complex seasonal designs or create their own by mixing and matching "basics," like French, half moon and ombré, with "extras," such as studs, foil and glitter. And at Chillhouse, clients can choose designs from a signature menu of 14 looks or a seasonal look book that's updated twice a year. To increase awareness, the salons all promote their menu designs on social media.


Adopting a nail art menu offers the opportunity to standardize appointment times and pricing for nail art, something that can be difficult to do with custom work. Sundays charges set fees for nail art on up to 2 nails or all 10 nails, while Color Camp charges standardized prices for seasonal looks, basics and extras. "Transparent pricing is super important for us," says Caruso. "I wanted to make sure that our clients knew exactly how much the art was going to cost." Chillhouse uses a tiered pricing system. "We have three tiers of pricing that were determined by time and our desired margins based on said time," says Ramirez.


Although nail art menus offer many benefits to salon owners, they do present a few challenges. Owners must be sure every tech on staff is proficient at creating the looks on the menu in a specific time frame, so regular training sessions are a must. It also means salons must sometimes say no to clients' Sundays changes its nail looks seasonally, while Chillhouse updates its book of nail art designs twice a year.

off-menu art requests. "Because we focus so much on nail art, people come to expect that we can do whatever picture they find on Pinterest," Caruso says. "We have to balance what the customer wants with ensuring a consistent standard and brand representation." Likewise, Sundays and Chillhouse discourage clients from requesting custom nail art.

Still, these salon owners have found nail menus help hook nail art newbies and boost profits. "I don't know how many times I've heard clients say it's their first time trying it," says Lin. "It's a great way to increase revenue." Ramirez concurs, estimating that more than 75 percent of Color Camp's appointments include nail art.

Ready to create a nail art menu for your salon? Ramirez offers this advice: "Understand your clients and their personal style. The designs that work for us may not work for your salon, and vice versa. Also, make sure it feels authentic to your salon's brand-that's rule No. 1!"

HANGING BY A NAIL

Baseball pitchers, according to a recent article in *ESPN The Magazine*, are willing to go to great lengths to preserve their nails during highstakes games, relying on Super Glue, acrylic, nail hardeners, pickle juice and even their own urine to keep their digits in top shape! The friction and pressure on fingertips and nails that pitching entails can trigger a variety of issues for players, the article stated, ranging from blood blisters under the nail to broken and cracked nails, potentially forcing players to spend full games–or even a whole season–on the bench.

While researching the article, *ESPN The Magazine* spoke to more than a dozen Major League Baseball (MLB) pitchers who've struggled with fingernail problems. Take Blue Jays pitcher Aaron Sanchez, for example, whose recurrent blood blisters under the nail eventually mandated him to cut his 2017 season short. When surgical removal of a portion of Sanchez's nail and even self-applied Super Glue (the therapy of choice for many pitchers suffering from nail woes) failed to work, he adjusted his pitching method to



compensate for the compromised nail, only to suffer a torn ligament. The pressure to perform is so high that some players have confessed to using pickle juice– popularized by Hall of Fame pitcher Nolan Ryan–or even their own urine to preserve their nails. Dodgers' Walker Buehler says he urinated on his finger after loosing a nail when pitching for Double-A Tulsa last year, although he acknowledged that he has no idea if the treatment is effective. (In our limited expertise in this matter, we have our doubts!)

Other pitchers have sought the services of nail technicians to fix cracked and broken nails. Diamondbacks reliever Archie Bradley tapped the Desert Nail Spa in Scottsdale, Arizona, this past spring to apply an acrylic nail over his fingernail that had been splitting down the center, and Mets



knuckleballer R.A. Dickey became a regular nail salon client in 2011 after visiting a Queens nail salon for an acrylic replacement when a weakened nail had ripped down to the nail bed. During the offseason, Dickey allowed his natural nail to grow back, and after a successful season he was traded to the Blue Jays, who signed him to a two-year, \$25 million extension. "My nail was literally the difference in millions of dollars," Dickey was quoted as saying in the article.

Many pitchers, however, are reluctant to speak on the record about their various nail issues, fearing that it could affect their value in contract negotiations or be seen as a breach in MLB policy, which forbids pitchers from attaching anything to their hands or fingers. "I hate when guys keep talking about this stuff," said one pitcher in the article, who admitted to using a nail cast but didn't want to be identified by name. "If I didn't have that, my nail would be broken all the time and I wouldn't be able to pitch. Nobody really cares that it's on there. But if there's all these articles written about it, then it brings attention to it and MLB might say something. It's one of those things–don't ask, don't tell."

Maybe so, but for nail salons, at least, we think the increased awareness *could* be the harbinger of a whole new revenue stream!

Hit the Silk

Call it a 'kerchief if you like, but the silk scarf certainly got more mileage on this season's runways than it has in years. But not as a dainty square of silk-no, designers blew up silk scarf prints to large proportions, weaving varying patterns into alluring pantsuits and dresses (see: Richard Quinn and Tory Burch). In an eco-conscious move, designer Marine Serre collected silk scarves for months on end only to upcycle them into flowing patchwork caftans and skirts with slits cut up to the hip. At 3.1 Phillip Lim, that same crafty approach of sewing together a mishmash of silk scarves looked even more delicately beautiful, thanks to a handkerchief hem and shoulder straps designed to look as if the model had tied them herself. Such prints, from paisley to floral to polka dot, certainly lend themselves to nail art-but how do you make them appear scarflike in your design? Take guest artist Celine Cumming's renditions as your lead: Paint your chosen print in a square, rectangle or patchwork formation, and then edge the design with stripes.

Let Her Dip

AVOID COMMON DIPPING POWDER ISSUES WITH THESE EXPERT TROUBLESHOOTING TIPS.

Durable, long-lasting dip enhancements are ideal for on-the-go clients, especially during the hustle of the holiday season. But what happens when something goes amiss? "Dipping powder provides beautiful results and is currently in high demand, but it can be a mess if done incorrectly," says Marilyn Garcia, Cuccio global director of education and brand ambassador. Here, Garcia walks us through solutions to some of the most common dipping powder problems: lifting, cracking and expanding.

FYI!

All dip systems vary, so make sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions for proper application.



THE PROBLEM: LIFTING


Lifting occurs when dipping powder doesn't properly adhere to the nail. As with lifting of all types of enhancements, this issue stems from the prepping stage of the service. The nail plate must be free of debris and moisture to ensure proper adhesion.

THE SOLUTION Take extra time with your prep steps if you find that clients' dip nails are lifting. Use a good cuticle remover to release any dead skin from the nail plate. "I like to use a 180-grit file to lightly buff the surface of the nail; it gives just the right texture to the nail surface to promote adhesion," says Garcia. Follow with a primer to dehydrate the nail before applying the base.

THE PROBLEM: CRACKING

Vertical cracking occurs when the product is applied unevenly between layers and coats. The angle in which the brush is held plays a critical role: "If the brush is tilted upright and perpendicular to the nail, product builds unevenly and creates hills and ridges, which can lead to cracking," says Garcia. Likewise, dipping the finger into the powder at 90 degrees (i.e., straight up and down) will also lead to an uneven surface.

THE SOLUTION To ensure even application, hold the brush parallel to the nail, moving it from the cuticle to the free edge in long strokes. Then, guide the nail into the dipping powder at a 45-degree angle to ensure a smooth powder surface.

THE PROBLEM: EXPANDING

Maintaining color within the boundaries of the nail can be difficult–even when using thin coats and layers of product. "Dipping powder absorbs product quickly and tends to spread over sidewalls and cuticles if it isn't properly applied," says Garcia.

THE SOLUTION Apply adhesive on three-quarters of the nail, leaving a small margin below the cuticle. Dip the finger in the first coat of dip powder at a 45-degree angle. Tap off the excess. Apply a second coat of adhesive, this time leaving only a sliver of space below the cuticle. Repeat the dipping process. Working in small increments—even dipping up to three times—getting closer to the cuticle as you apply will help avoid flooding the cuticle and sidewalls with color.

Working with glitter can be tricky no matter what the medium, and glitter dip is no different. "Glitter dipping powder is coarser and contains larger particles than basic color powders, so it tends to get bulky with each coat," says Marilyn Garcia. After the second coat of glitter dip, apply a third coat of adhesive, and guide the nail into clear dipping powder to cover the entire nail, encasing the large glitter particles without bulking or expanding past the cuticle or sidewalls. Garcia teaches this process with the mantra, "Glitter, glitter, clear!"




Step 1 Apply one coat of sheer black gel polish. Use a flat brush to paint a deep V-shape around the perimeter of the nail with white gel, covering the sidewalls. **Step 2** Use a small detail brush to fill in the white space with triangles in red, yellow, green, royal blue, light blue and black gel paint.

Step 3 Paint a gold line down the center of the nail with a stripping brush. Paint a gold triangle in the center of the sheer black triangle, leaving space on all sides. **Step 4** Outline the gold stripe and triangle with black gel paint. Add black lines and small triangles inside the gold shape. Finish with gel top coat.



Step 1 Apply two coats of silver glitter gel polish.
Step 2 Paint curved stripes with red, orange and yellow jelly polish.
Step 3 Outline the stripes with black gel paint. Finish with gel top coat.



Step 1 Apply one coat of sheer black gel polish. Create three diamonds down the center of the nail with blue gel paint, connecting the corners of each shape.
 Step 2 Paint two smaller diamonds inside the top corner of the blue shapes with red gel paint.

Step 3 Use a micro detail brush to draw diagonal white lines from the cuticle to the middle of the nail. Paint a yellow line down the center of the nail starting at the bottom corner of the last blue shape. Fill in the rest of the negative space with yellow diagonal lines from the center to the free edge.

Step 4 Outline the center shapes with black gel paint. Finish with gel top coat.

*Cure after every gel application unless otherwise noted.

How to Stop Lifting

"It's not always clear why some people lift more than others. Some people's natural nails just will not hold enhancements no matter what. We can only speculate that some unknown aspect of body chemistry may be to blame." -Paul Bryson, principle scientist, OPI

"Problems relating to improper adhesion (lifting) are difficult to solve if you don't understand why they happen. Adhesion is a force that causes two surfaces to stick together, and the small area between two adhered surfaces is called the adhesive bond. As long as this bond is intact, the surfaces will not come apart. Properly cleaning the solid surface and proper application techniques will help prevent delamination, the breaking of the adhesive bond. That being said, you can use the best products and application techniques and still have lifting. How can that happen? The nail plate contains a high percentage of both water and oil. Both of these can cause lifting if they are found on the surface of the nail plate. The best way to ensure proper adhesion is to start with a clean, dry surface. Scrubbing the nail will remove surface oils and contaminants, and temporary nail dehydrators eliminate surface moisture for up to 30 minutes."

"There are no shortcuts to preventing lifting. It's a combination of correct prep, good application and proper finishing. First, I remove shine from the nail with an e-file and nothing coarser then a medium arbor band. (Note: There is a right way and a wrong way to do this technique, so make sure you're trained correctly before using an e-file.) Then, I cleanse the nail before using Young Nails Protein Bond. It's not a primer; it's a bonder that acts like doublesided sticky tape. When it comes to acrylic application, make sure that your pearl is on the wet side. If it's too dry, it won't bond well to the natural nail. It's also very important that the application at the cuticle be as flush to the natural nail as possible. You don't want any ledges, which will lead to a lot of filing. Finally, when it comes to finishing, it's important to blend the perimeter of the nail as tight as possible. Again, you don't want ledges, as they can lead to snags around the edges. When acrylic is applied well, there's less filing required, which means the bond to the natural nail won't be disrupted."



HEATHER REYNOSA Education Ambassador CND

"Lifting occurs when there isn't a correct bond between the product and the nail plate. Therefore, the best way to prevent lifting is through proper prep of the nail plate and product control. It's important to be very thorough when removing cuticle stuck to the nail plate-a quick swipe of the file isn't enough! A sharp tool and a good cuticle solvent are your best friends. The next important thing is product control. If your beads are too wet or too dry, you're going to get lifting for different reasons. Too wet? The product is sure to run into the eponychium and cause pocket lifting. Too dry? It won't bond properly to the keratin, which means more lifting. Make sure that your acrylic beads are a medium-wet consistency; they should be creamy and very pliable. Press the acrylic into the nail to help the bond take place. Finally, when performing your finish filing, make sure that you really seal the edges of your product to prevent any further opportunities for lifting."



ELAINE WATSON Executive Vice President Kupa

"Tight nail prep and application are the keys to combating adhesion issues on particularly lift-prone nails. The nail plate must be clean of surface contaminants and overgrown cuticles. I like to use a diamond bit with an e-file set at its lowest speed to remove the cuticle from the nail plate. I find that this technique works better and more thoroughly than a pusher. When it comes to application, work on one finger at a time. First, megadehydrate the nail, then apply primer and finally apply the nail product. Once that nail is complete, move to the next one and perform the three steps. It may take a little longer, but it will help ensure a completely dry nail plate for the best product adhesion."

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A Physician's Formula

ELEVATE YOUR SERVICES AND KEEP COMPROMISED CLIENTS SAFE BY OBTAINING ADVANCED TRAINING IN MEDICAL PEDICURES.

With elderly populations on the rise-not to mention increases in chronic diseases like diabetes-there's a greater need than ever before for safe salon services. Thankfully, today's advanced training can educate techs on everything they need to know to perform a medical pedicure, or medi-pedi, from flawless sterilization procedures to best practices when servicing chronically ill clients (and when to refer them to a medical professional). "It's an industry that's growing because there's a need and demand for healthy, safe, sterile salons," notes Letisha Royster, owner of Waterless Medi-Pedi & Nail Spa in Roswell, Georgia. "People are looking for salons they can have confidence in." Considering expanding your skill set to learn how to perform medi-pedis? Here's what you need to know.



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WORDS OF WARNING

Attaining advanced training in pedicure services for clients with medical conditions can help boost business, but techs need to watch their wording when advertising services, says Janet McCormick, cofounder of Nailcare Academy in Fort Myers, Florida. "Some states, like Ohio and Colorado, don't allow nail technicians to use terminology like medi-pedi or medical pedicure, as they feel the techs are making false claims," she explains. "They focus on the fact that we are 'cosmetic' in all of our services by law and cannot use the word 'medical' without perpetrating misunderstanding. Ultimately, the difference between a medi-pedi and other pedis is in the enhanced knowledge the nail tech has regarding what precautions she must take to perform services on persons having certain illnesses-not in actual protocol."

Safer Services

Medi-pedi services go beyond a basic pedicure and polish by taking into consideration a client's health concerns, including any pre-existing conditions that might compromise their lower extremities. One of the most important components, says Vicki Malo, president of the North American School of Podology in Toronto, is a thorough consultation and evaluation. "A tech with advanced training in medical pedicures understands what recommendations should be made for in-salon services and home-care, when to refer clients to a medical professional and what implements to use," says Malo. "For compromised clients, you need stainless steel or single-use implements, an autoclave and possibly an electric file with a special bit for reducing thick nails."

Janet McCormick, cofounder of Nailcare Academy in Fort Myers, Florida, adds that compromised clients (such as those with a chronic illness) often require a lighter touch–and knowing what to do according to the situation is crucial. For example, soaking, which can lead to dryness, should be skipped on diabetics; techs should avoid aromatherapy on at-risk pregnant women; and certain massage techniques can tear the thinner skin of elderly clients. "You can even save lives by spotting cancer on the foot, because techs with advanced training know what to look for," McCormick says. "And, by specializing in the chronically ill, techs can make more money. Once these clients visit, they never leave because they feel safe."

Malo agrees that perhaps the greatest benefit to offering medi-pedi services is the ability to positively impact clients' lives. "Beyond enhancing your income and targeting a growing niche within the pedicure market, you can have a profound effect on how clients feel," she says. "You can help with calluses, corns and thick toenails. The bottom line is, you enhance your skill set and simply know how to provide a good, clean pedicure service for anyone."

Pedi Partnerships

To become certified in these types of advanced services, techs can receive training online or in person through a variety of programs, which may include an internship with a podiatrist to receive hands-on experience. After receiving the appropriate training, techs will find a bevy of opportunities open to them: They may choose to stay in a traditional salon, work in a podiatrist's office or at an elderly care/retirement facility, go mobile and visit clients at home, or open their own salon or suite specializing in advanced foot care. Royster notes that even athletes visit her salon, since they're so dependent on healthy feet, as well as clients who've had infections due to unsanitary services in the past.

Regardless of the path you choose, when you're trained in providing medipedis, it's beneficial to partner with a local medical professional to encourage referrals on both sides. Malo and McCormick agree that when meeting with local podiatrists, it's important to dress professionally and bring backup materials to build trust, such as a resume, referrals and any credentials obtained. "Ask for the office manager, not the podiatrist," McCormick advises. "Explain what you're trained to do and that you would like referrals, and leave brochures they can give to their clients."

Meanwhile, Malo recommends demonstrating your skills by offering a sample service to someone in the office and finding potential partnerships by asking current clients if they see a podiatrist. "Take before-and-after pictures of your work, and write out your disinfection process," Malo suggests. "During services, make sure you stay within the scope of your practice." In other words, techs with advanced training never diagnose or treat diseases, but they do know the "three Rs," Malo says: recognize, recommend, refer!

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

From the decadent oils and sweet-scented lotions to the perfect amount of pressure in all of the right places, a good massage can instantly elevate any service, transforming a routine mani/pedi into an indulgent biweekly treat. "A good massage allows clients to slow down for a minute and ends the service on a positive note," enthuses Karen Kops, cofounder of Poppy & Monroe salon and Vetiver Modern Massage studio in Nashville, Tennessee. While the massage remains clients' favorite part of a service, nail techs often feel pressure to skip this step or cut it short when they're slammed with back-to-back appointments or



running behind. A massage doesn't have to be lengthy in order to be effective, however; all techs need is the proper technique and an arsenal of quality products to make the experience memorable.

The first step in improving your massage practices is to ensure that techs' skills are up to par. "Lack of proper training is often the No. 1 culprit for a bad massage," warns Kops, who recommends partnering with a local massage school to help techs understand the different types of strokes, such as effleurage (long sweeping strokes), petrissage (kneading), tapping, friction and vibration. Techs should also ask probing



Product selection is also key. Kops suggests using a gel or oil that offers plenty of slip but doesn't leave behind a greasy residue. Products rich in jojoba oil, aloe vera and vitamin E are ideal for providing lasting moisture to the skin. "We also use cannabidiol (CBD) oil to provide additional muscle relaxation and work out kinks," says Kops. Consider swapping synthetic fragrances for essential oils to take advantage of plant-based extracts' therapeutic properties. "Lavender and vetiver are great for calming and reducing anxiety, while a citrus blend is invigorating and energizing," she explains. Ready to step up your massage game? TAKE THE TIME TO SET RESOLUTIONS (AND STICK TO THEM!) TO ENSURE A PROSPEROUS BUSINESS.

The end of the year marks a time to step back and focus on the big picture: Where do you want your business to go and what steps must you take to get there? Establishing New Year's resolutions for your business, such as investing in a new marketing campaign, implementing staff training or expanding to a new location, is a secret to long-term success. Whether you've wrapped 2018 with a bang or a bust, here are some resolutions to make as you take your business into 2019.

Assess Your Staff

The old adage that you're only as good as your team has merit, which is why this is a good time to evaluate where you can use extra (or better) help. When considering your staffing needs, however, make sure to think about the whole picture, not just whether or not you have enough nail techs. "As I got busier, it got harder to focus on the needs of my staff," says Donna Perillo, owner of Sweet Lily Natural Nail Spa in New York City. "We now have a human resources manager who takes care of all of that and makes sure the staff is happy, too." Perillo also hired a graphic



designer to produce digital newsletters, shelf talkers and other in-store signage. "People wonder why I would need a graphic designer for a nail salon," she says. "Surprisingly, it's a full-time job."

Keep Up With Trends

Investing in education and training can keep you and your business fresh. Pay attention to what's trending on social media as well as client requests, and make sure you're prepared to meet demand. Case in point: When the Chicago Cubs were headed to the World Series in 2016, Chicago-based STIL Salon and Spa noticed an uptick in demand for nail art that showed fan pride. STIL manager Stela Sotiraj reacted quickly to make sure her techs were up to speed. "We held a mini training session for staff," says Sotiraj, who set up in-salon art tutorials to support the popular pastime. "We're constantly adding new nail art to our services based on client needs."

For Perillo, staying informed involves attending tradeshows to seek out new products. "We keep our pulse on everything that's going on in retail and beauty," she says, adding that she's willing to travel to find products that meet her standards. "I'm adamant about spending my dollars on brands handcrafted in the United States." Make sure to research when the tradeshows and education events are scheduled for the year ahead so you can plan accordingly.

Re-Evaluate Your Business Plan

It's a good idea to revisit your business plan every year. Do you need to accommodate for a changing market? How do you stand out from the salon around the corner? You should reevaluate your costs, your expertise and inflation every year to ensure that your prices are competitive, making adjustments as needed. If you find business has been lagging, it may also



be time to consider adding (or removing) services or adjusting your business model to ensure that you're differentiating yourself from the competition.

When Rachel Cheng opened her highend nail salon ZaZa in San Francisco's South of Market area of in 2005, she saw the potential for growth in the up-and-coming neighborhood, home to a new ballpark and an increasing number of tech startups. As the neighborhood began to expand, Cheng started to think about how her business could serve a growing–and changing–clientele. "People were coming in with their own champagne or wine bottles, but I didn't have a license to serve," she says. That's when she decided to secure a liquor license and remodel the salon to feel more like a lounge. Offering a sommelier-selected wine menu (not to mention free chocolates and Wi-Fi) turned her salon, now named ZaZa Nail and Wine Lounge, into something much more chic–with the profits to show for it. "We went from the occasional corporate party during the holidays to one every week," she says, adding that the salon's wine tasting events and movie nights have also been a hit. "It makes it fun while everyone gets pampered."

Dig Into Data

Salon software can help you manage appointments, client contact information, staff trainings and inventory to be sure, but the data collected by the system throughout the year can also be an invaluable tool to running your business. This year, resolve to take a deeper dive into your salon software data. Reviewing sales reports can help you determine





what promotions to reintroduce next year, how you can reward repeat customers or reactivate old ones and in what ways you might want to change your inventory. "I look at my numbers every month to see whether I increased or decreased, what I'm spending more on and whether that investment is really worth it," says Cheng.

Not using salon software? Now is the time to start—or re-evaluate the products on the market if you've been using the same system for a while. "Every year I sit down and revisit payroll services and see what new computer programs are out there for scheduling and booking," says Perillo.

Fine-Tune Priorities

If business is going well, you may be tempted to expand. How do you know when you're ready? Experts say it's generally best to wait until you've gotten three profitable years in business under your belt. Before you take the leap, however, consider your lifestyle and limits. After opening ZaZa, Cheng expanded to four locations, but two kids later she found it impossible to manage. "I decided to focus on the two salons I have in San Francisco so I could spend more time with my kids," she says.

There's also the opportunity to give some love to the space you already have. "My New Year's resolution for my team and business is to go back to the way we used to do it," says Perillo. "We were doing a lot of collaborations offsite, and I got dragged out of the spa and more into the office working on strategy," she explains. "I just miss being in the spa. I miss seeing customers every day."

When it comes to New Year's resolutions of any type, simply writing them down and committing to them is half the battle. Still, it's important to note that change doesn't happen overnight. Be realistic about your goals and establish a reasonable timeline to achieve them, and by the close of 2019, you'll be relishing in the payoff from your hard work.

20 Ways to Up Your Glitter Game

1. FEED HUNGRY GLITTERS

Dense glitter polishes can hog top coatleaving nails with a gritty texture that not all clients appreciate. Achieve a smooth surface by applying a volumizing top coat that's designed to deliver a plump, gel-like finish without curing.

2. FILL-IN FLAWLESSLY

The key to filling a glittered gel enhancement is to ensure that the new product blends seamlessly with the existing gel. How? Lay a shallow "pillow" of clear gel near the cuticle and pull the product over the rest of the nail and cure. Then, use a separate brush to gently tap various glitters into the dispersion layer, carefully recreating the glitter density and color distribution on the rest of the nail. Cure quickly to set, then coat with another layer of clear gel for a smooth finish.

3. GO INCOGNITO

Have a client who's a little shy when it comes to bling? Offer some covert glam instead. Build a thin, clear extension, followed by a coat of glittered product on the free edge. Coat the entire nail with a solid opaque shade, completely covering the glitter. Once cured and shaped, add shiny top coat to the underside of the nails and the hidden glitter will emerge.

4. MAKE IT METAL

Going for a total glitter look? A solid metallic base color will mimic glitter's reflective finish-filling in any particle gaps on the nail plate and allowing you to create a perfect curve at the cuticle, get close to the sidewalls and seal the tip-with no impact on sparkle.

5. DIP A GRADE-A GRADIENT

Acrylic dip systems come in a variety of glittery finishes and make achieving glitter gradients a snap. Follow the manufacturer's instructions and coat the entire nail in a base color. Then, using the included brush, apply a coat of the base component starting at the free edge, feathering it slightly onto the rest of the nail. Dip the nail partway into a glittery shade, remove excess powder with a brush, and top with a full coat of clear dip, followed by activator and top coat.



6. RUN FROM RUNS

Not just any loose glitter will do! "I can't stress enough the importance of using cosmetic-grade glitter," says Miss Pop. Not only is it critical for health purposes, but cosmetic-grade glitters are more colorfast. "Color can run off craft glitters in top coat," she explains.

7. SHARPEN YOUR SMILE

To achieve an ultrasharp smile line when sculpting a set of glitter-tipped gel nails, use the reverse application method. After building a thin extension with clear gel, remove the form and create the nail bed up to the smile line with opaque gel, and then flash cure. After curing, apply the glitter gel carefully to the tip, slowly pushing it up to (but not over) the opaque ledge. Cure again, and then finish with a final coat of clear gel to reinforce the apex and encapsulate the gel.

8. STORE IT ARTFULLY

Loose glitter is often sold in plastic bags-an inconvenient and frustrating storage solution. Immediately transfer loose glitters or your own custom glitter mixes into small, capped jars for secure storage and transport. Glue magnets to the bottom of each jar and attach your glitter collection to a metal wall panel for easy access and instant wall art!

9. MAKE A JELLY SANDWICH

Creating a glittered jelly look on natural nails is as easy as making a sandwich. Apply one to two coats of translucent jelly polish, followed by a single coat of less dense glitter polish with a clear base. Finally, apply one more coat of the jelly color. Instantly the glitter appears suspended in a smooth, squishy finish.

10. PERFECT PLACEMENT

Though time consuming, intricate designs created with individually placed glitters are impressive. Make placement less maddening with specialty tools created specifically to pick up small sequins and glitters, or improvise your own by adding a bead of hot glue to the end of a pointed orangewood stick.

POLISHES

11. REMOVE IT RIGHT

Why is glitter so difficult to remove? Flat glitter particles adhere snugly to the nail plate, keeping solvent out. Give remover time to seep underneath the glitter by placing an acetone-soaked cotton pad over the nail and allowing it to soak. Make removal even speedier by taking advantage of your client's body heat. Just wrap the fingertips in foil or finger caps. Or, for quick, soak-free removal, start the mani with a peel-off base coat.

Inspire clients to try a glittery mani by showing them some sample looks. Each holiday, Lee creates 12 glittery designs for her clients to choose from and displays them at her station. "It gives them an idea of what they may want for the holiday season, and I have everything I need prepared to do those nails," she says.

13. DO THE DAB

OPI

Metamorphosis You Little Shade Shifter opi.com

Skip the nail polish brush and use a cosmetic sponge to achieve full-coverage glitter nail polish. Apply the polish to the end of the sponge and dab it several times over the nail plate. The sponge absorbs some of the base polish, depositing pure glitter. A few coats may be necessary. For easy cleanup, use a liquid latex barrier around the nail bed before dabbing.

14. MIX IT UP

Easily create custom glitter acrylic blends by combining two parts clear acrylic with one part glitter. Test your mix with monomer to ensure that it forms a bead correctly and add additional acrylic if required. Place a small bead of your creation on the top of the jar so you can easily identify the contents later.

15. CLEAN UP

Miss Pop uses painter's tape to easily remove wayward sparkle beyond the nail plate. "I roll a piece of blue painter's tape around my own finger and use it to gently press the skin around the client's nail," she says. She recommends pressing on the cuticle last–when the tape is less sticky–as this area can be more sensitive for clients. For sensitive hands that are prone to redness, wait until the manicure is completely dry, and then use a brush to gently remove extra glitter instead.

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16. ENCAPSULATE SPARKLE

Be sure to encapsulate glitter when creating enhancements. Start with a thin foundation of regular gel or acrylic, and then apply glitter. "Use the existing product to secure the glitter in place, but ensure that the acrylic is completely dry or the gel is totally cured before moving on," says Suzie Moskal, founder of Suzie's Nail Career Education. "Finally, apply a thin, final structure layer over the entire nail, making sure everything is encased and adding more clear product to ensure the apex and nail is thick enough where needed."

17. SUGAR AN ACCENT

"Sugaring an accent nail is a lot of fun for the holidays and adds a lot of bling to the nail," says Katie Lee, education coordinator for Young Nails. Simply sprinkle finely milled glitter onto no-wipe gel top coat and cure. That's it! This sweet finish requires no additional top coat.

18. CREATE A GEMSTONE 19. SKIP THE

Specialty gem gels create realistic opalescent effects while pure glitter gel can be used to simulate precious gems, like rubies, sapphires and emeralds. The technique is super easy: First, create a gem-shaped outline on the nail with gel polish (a metallic gold or silver is an excellent choice). Then, pick up a bead of glitter gel with a dotting tool and place it within the shape-being careful not to cover your outline-and cure. Finish with a coat of clear gel.

SCRUBBING

If you find yourself and your station coated in glitter after a service, don't despair. A sticky lint roller or Play-Doh will easily pick up loose glitter on surfaces. For hands and hair, apply some lotion or olive oil, then wash and rinse as normal.

20. GO BEYOND THE NAIL

Don't forget to think outside the nail plate! To continue the sparkle from the nail onto the surrounding hand, Miss Pop uses spirit gum, an adhesive traditionally used to attach theatrical prosthetics, to create a design on the skin. She then presses loose glitter into the sticky finish. The spirit gum offers a durable hold, but is easily removed with an inexpensive spirit gum remover that you can offer clients as a part of the service. And the best part? After removing the glitter from skin, the manicure remains flawless.

TOUGH SPOT

LEARN HOW TO SAFELY SERVICE CLIENTS WITH PAINFUL AND UNSIGHTLY CORNS.

Putting on a pair of heels for a holiday party may be the last thing your client wants to do if she's suffering from painful and unsightly corns–areas of thickened skin that commonly develop on the feet and toes to protect the skin from irritation. As a nail tech, however, you can help clients with corns find some relief *and* improve their feet's appearance. Here, learn how to safely and effectively care for corns during pedicure services.

UNDERSTANDING CORNS

The first thing nail techs should know about corns-one of the most common foot ailmentsis that they aren't contagious. According to the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA), corns occur when something rubs against the foot repeatedly or causes excess pressure against part of the foot. Corns are most often caused by tight- or ill-fitting shoes, not wearing socks, foot deformities, such a bunions and hammertoes, frequent walking or running and aging. If corns aren't treated in a timely manner, the root of the corn can reach the nerve ending and compress it, causing pain, says Florida-based North American School of Podiatry certified master pedicurist Anna Byrnes. "Deep core calluses can form as a result, and frequent and long-term healing corns can be a manifestation of serious problems," says Byrnes.

Although people sometimes mistakenly use the terms corns and calluses interchangeably, they aren't the same. Corns and calluses do, however, fall into the same skin condition category, known as hyperkeratosis, where the



skin thickens due to the body producing extra keratin, a fibrous protein found in the fingernails, hair and skin. This keratin can thicken and cause corns and calluses because of inflammation, pressure or a genetic condition. According to the APMA, the term callus is commonly used if the thickening of the skin is located on the bottom of the foot, while the term corn refers to thickening occurring on the top of the foot or toe. But location isn't as important as the thickened skin's pattern and appearance. Flat, widespread skin thickening, sometimes appearing yellowish in color, indicates a callus, and skin lesions that are smaller, thicker and deeper indicate a corn. Hard corns are sometimes pink due to inflammation and located on top of bony toes, while soft corns have a rubbery texture with a whitish color and are located in between toes. A final distinction: Corns can be painful when pressed on, but calluses are usually not painful.

SERVICING CLIENTS WITH CORNS

While corns can go away on their own, nail technicians can also help alleviate clients' discomfort by treating the condition during services. "The use of pumice stones of varying roughness is recommended on clean, moist surfaces," says Byrnes. Jolivette Wallace, Ph.D., owner of Mani's & Pedi's in Ridgeland, Mississippi, says she frequently sees corns on clients at her salon, many of whom are professional women who often wear high heels. For clients who have corns, Wallace always begins each pedicure service with an 8-to-10 minute soak in warm water to soften the

Sources: Mayo Clinic, mayoclinic.org; Anna Byrnes, certified master pedicurist thickened skin. "This is a very important step," says Wallace. "Next, we safely file the corn with a warm, wet pumice stone. Carefully moving the stone in a circular motion aids in the removal of the dry skin. It's important to be gentle and steer away from rough or abrasive filing." The service concludes with a moisturizing mask and lotion. Postservice, Wallace encourages at-home care using a moisturizing lotion or cream that contains salicylic acid, ammonium lactate or urea. "These ingredients help gradually soften hard corns and calluses," she explains.

While it's generally safe to service clients with corns, nail techs should recommend that they see a podiatrist if their corns become very painful or inflamed or inhibit their daily life.

Although some clients expect immediate results, nail technicians should never perform risky services, warns Wallace. "Unfortunately in the nailcare industry, some technicians perform unsafe and even illegal practices for the convenience of a smooth appearance," she says. "This is dangerous, unsanitary and can be detrimental to the client's health. Clients have requested the credo blade or 'cheese grater,' although this is illegal in the state of Mississippi. Our goal and concern are for the care of our clients. We're patient in educating our clients on nail health and procedures that will benefit them in the long term."

While it's generally safe to service clients with corns, nail techs should recommend that they see a podiatrist if their corns become very painful or inflamed or inhibit their daily life. Also, people with diabetes, poor circulation or other serious illnesses should have their feet checked regularly.

PREVENTION

During services, techs can take the opportunity to offer clients who have corns helpful tips for homecare.

"Look for shoes that fit well and are comfortable, wear padding around the corn to prevent the corn from coming in contact with the shoe and keep toenails professionally trimmed," says Wallace. In addition, wearing clean, breathable cotton socks can help: When feet are sweaty, they can cause the foot to move around and create harsh friction on the skin. Though corns may be a nuisance for clients, nail techs can help by providing gentle care and some common-sense tips for prevention.

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

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
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WHO WEARS BETTER BLING?
